Review of 2016

This is the time of the year when newspapers, TV and radio compile a review of the year past and this year the RO will join in to review Group activities over the last 12 months.

Membership stands at around 90 split 58% cars and 42% bikes. We had 22 new Associate members joining us in 2016, 10 on the car side and 12 on the bike side. Our test pass numbers are down on last year with a total of 7 passes (3 cars, 4 bikes of which 2 were F1RSTS).

Work on re-qualifying Observers under the new arrangements was slow to start but lately we have made better progress and we now have 4 Local Observers (2 cars and 2 bikes) and 7 National Observers (4 cars, 2 bikes and 1 car and bike). A number of trainee Local Observers are close to completing their training so we expect numbers to increase significantly in the next couple of months.

Group nights (2nd Tuesday of the month - see dates for your diary) continued with a varied range of speakers and activities. We were away from the Boathouse on 4 occasions - visits to the RADAR centre in Belfast, to the Excelsior cinema in Comber, the Ulster Transport Museum and to Room2race for the usual night of mayhem on the virtual race-track. Visiting speakers included Damian Coll from the Forensic service, Richard Gladman from IAM HQ, and Paul Matthews of Oakland Insurance. We also had a table-top rally organised by Alistair Gillespie.

On the bike side the regular runs out continued throughout the year to locations including the Ards Peninsula, Ballycastle, Newcastle, Antrim Hills and Glens, Lough Neagh circuit and Portstewart. An important part of these runs is the stops for refreshments and the social element and not to be outdone the car side had a drive day over some interesting roads in County Antrim finishing with a meal in Coleraine.

All told, 2016 was a successful year for the Group and the Committee is currently planning a diverse range of activities and speakers for the forthcoming year.

On a more serious note, road traffic deaths in Northern Ireland stood at 66 to 23 December 2016 and while this is down by 4 at the same point last year it is still too many and reinforces the need for us to spread the message about road safety and to continue our efforts to improve standards of driving and riding in 2017.

Winter - be prepared

It can take a bit longer to get yourself going on a cold, dark winter morning, and getting the car going is no different. Give yourself the time to deal with the extra things involved in getting on the road."

Here are some tips to avoid seasonal car problems:

- A modern car does not need to warm the engine up before being driven, so avoid wasting fuel by not switching on the engine until you are ready to go. But do run it if you need to use the heater/ demister before you move off, so you can start with a nice clear screen.
- Clean any snow off the car's roof and bonnet as well as windows – it seems obvious when you see it all blow off someone else's roof, but in the early morning rush it's easy to think it won't matter, when it does. What will happen if the snow like this were to slide onto the windscreen?
- When you get in the car, make sure all extras such as lights, heaters and the radio - are turned off before you turn the key to start the engine. Starting puts a heavy load on the system.

- Clean your windows inside and out (not just take the ice off) – a dirty screen will mist up quicker than one that's clean.
- Using the aircon helps keep the air in the car drier, and avoid misting up. It seems odd putting air conditioning on in the cold but it works! Just remember to set the temperature up as well.
- Think about where you park at night. Some places will be less affected by ice on the windows because of shelter from buildings, or protection from trees – you may be able to save yourself some early morning problems by where you park at night.
- Check the battery is in good condition that your screen wash has a freeze-resistant additive, and do any other preparation for winter your car needs.

Frosty mornings can be beautiful to look at – but awful to drive in if you and the car aren't prepared for them.
